Did you Know??

The earliest known Irish surname is O'Clery (O Cleirigh); it's the earliest known because it was written that the lord of Aidhne, Tigherneath **Ua Cleirigh**, died in County Galway back in the year 916 A.D.

In fact, that Irish name may actually be the earliest surname recorded in all of Europe. Until about the 10th century in Ireland, surnames were not passed down from generation to generation. Surnames were based on someone's father's name. A person was identified by his given name plus "mac," meaning "son of," followed by his father's name. For instance, Brian mac Colum was Brian, son of Colum. And then "O" was sometimes used in place of "mac" and meant "grandson of" or "descended from." If Colum was well known, his grandson might have gone by the name Finnian O Colum.
