Can we do this-continued

Under NO circumstance can we endorse or appear to endorse a candidate; nor can we publish or say something against a political candidate. You should be especially conscious of this when posting on LAOH social media accounts.

We CAN write to or visit an elected official noting our agreement or disagreement with pending legislation that is part of our exempt purpose (Irish, Catholic, Immigration, and Catholic Social Justice issues)

You CAN wear a LAOH sash to a rosary rally, right to life gathering, or prayer vigil for a missing person or a social justice issue. No sign carrying is authorized, unless prior approval is granted.

You CANNOT wear a LAOH sash and protest, break windows, throw Molotov cocktails, carry vulgar signs, chat unkind words, and/or destroy property.

So, if you have question, please ask the email address wizard for an answer.

Since 1978, the Ancient Order of Hibernians and Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians have held a special relationship with the University of Notre Dame. The Notre Dame Fund includes a Scholarship for our members, their children and grandchildren, an Endowment to the Cushwa Center for Hibernian Research Awards and the Annual Hibernian Lecture. In 2016, the National Boards donated to the Keough Naughton Center Institute for Irish Studies for the documentary "The 1916 Irish Rebellion." Promotion of our Irish and Irish American History has always been a goal of our order and donating to both the Cushwa Center and the Keough Naughton Institute helps us achieve this goal.

I have been visiting the campus of Notre Dame most of my life but now I also have a special relationship with the University. I am honored and proud to serve our Order as the LAOH Hibernian Chair with AOH Past President Ned McGinley. During the past few years, I had the opportunity to meet with the Financial Office and the Cushwa Center along with other members of the AOH and LAOH National Boards to receive an annual update on our donations to the University. The University has been excellent stewards of our donations and many Hibernians have benefited from the Hibernian Scholarship. At last year's meeting, Shane Ulbrich Assistant Director of the Cushwa Center made the announcement that the Hibernian Lecture would be held in Dublin, Ireland for the first time. What exciting news!! My time for serving as Chair could not have been better. I was going to Ireland for our Hibernian Lecture.

The Luck of the Irish was very questionable in March of 2020 with Covid 19. The Cushwa Center continued to plan for the Hibernian Lecture. This Lecture was going to be very special. The Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Mary Ellen O'Neill Division #4, Mon Valley, Washington County is a Sisterhood of Irish and Irish American Catholic Women. The LAOH is a National Organization officially recognized in 1894 as the "Daughters of Erin" changed and incorporated to the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. in 2004. The Ladies hold true to the Motto of: Friendship, Unity and Christian Charity and are pledged to God and Country. The preamble of the LAOH constitution states that the intent and purpose of the LAOH is to promote the Motto among its members, assisting the people of Ireland, aiding the aged, sick, and infirm members and includes doing Mission Work and Catholic Action. The LAOH have actively participated in the in the Annual Irish History Writing Contests and have won Awards for their Division Newspapers. Our patron Saint is St. Brigid of Ireland. In 1980 both the Ladies and Men voted to fund a Hibernian Chair at the University of Notre Dame for the study of the history of the Catholic Church in the United States and the Irish contribution to that history. At each National Convention, the Order donates to the Columban Fathers and Sisters, the principal charities of the Order. A joint program of the AOH and LAOH "Project St. Patrick" works to assist religious vocations and provide financial support to

seminarians, religious men and women during their formation. This Project was to continue the vision of St. Patrick to bring the Gospel and the Eucharist to all people. Division #4 LAOH celebrated their 36th Anniversary of obtaining their Charter in September 1984. The Charter was blessed by the late Monsignor William J. Maher at the former St. Jerome Church, now St. Andrew the Apostle in Charleroi, Pa. Division #4 LAOH has been represented in Allegheny County, PA. activities, the Annual St. Patrick Day Communion Breakfast, served as Grand Marshall of the St. Patrick Day Parade in Pittsburgh, Pa., acknowledged Hibernian of the Year, attended Our Lady of Knock Masses, St. Brigid Communion Breakfasts and were represented in all State and National Conventions. Mary Ellen O'Neill, Division #4, supported their President, Dorothy Flaherty Weldon who also served as the State President of Pennsylvania and the National President as she signed a Contractual agreement with Boston College in her National President term 2006-2008 with the Burns Librarian, Dr. Robert K. O'Neill on November 1, 2006 that the Repository of John J. Burns Library, at Boston College will be the permanent receptacle for the archival materials for the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc. The receptacle is crucial in the preservation of the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians Work for future generations as well as to provide guidance and perspective for scholars interested in researching the largest Irish Catholic organization of women in this country.

LAOH Select National Life Members at Virtual Convention

The National Board can award up to 5 National Life Memberships at the Bi-annual Nation Convention and a 2/3 vote is necessary to be selected. No per capita or dues shall be required of National Life Members.

Patti Flaus is a member of Maud Gonne Division 32 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She has served in various Officer positions at the Division and County levels and has been an appointee to the State Board. In addition to elected offices held, Patti has served on various committees on the Division/County and State level as well as committees at the National Convention. Patti also helps our members reaffirm their dedication to our Order as a member of the local Degree Team since 1995. She has helped our membership maintain their dedication to the Catholic Church and Faith by organizing masses in honor of Saint Brigid and Our Lady of Knock, as well as spiritual retreats. THE MICHIGAN LAOH LOSES A PAST NATIONAL CHAPLAIN

The Catholic community is mourning the loss of Fr. Stephen Rooney, who passed away August 20th as a result of a tragic boating accident on the Detroit River.

Fr. Rooney was one of 15 children born in Belfast, Ireland in 1954. He is survived by 13 heartbroken brothers and sisters. He took his vows as a brother in the Redemptorist Order in 1975. However, in 1978 he entered the Cistercian Order and took his final vows while a member of that community in 1985. The following year he left for the United States to work as a priest in the diocese of Detroit. Dearly loved in every Parish he served, he was especially loved by the LAOH members of Michigan. When the Mary of the Gael Division was formed in Monroe, Maureen Shelton asked Fr. Rooney if we could meet at St. Michael the Archangel church where he was pastor

and he readily agreed. When Maureen ran for National President, she asked Fr. Rooney if he would be the National Chaplain if she should win. With his quick tongue and a great sense of humor he said he would say a novena that she wouldn't win as that wasn't his kind of thing. However, when Maureen became National President in 2012 Fr. Rooney agreed to be our National Chaplain. He said the Mass and gave a blessing at her Testimonial Dinner in November 2013.

After attending the 2014 National Convention in Louisville he jokingly said he would never complain about a Parish Council meeting again. Coming from the north of Ireland where Catholics suffered discrimination at the hands of the state heightened his strong sense of social justice. That compassion and his Irish wit brought people to whatever parish he pastored. He had a rapport with all his congregation; from grieving families, to the school children, to a sweet lady of ninety-six years who he would banter with every Sunday.

His long and eloquent obituary included this paragraph: "There's a short blessing in Irish: "Is gaire cabhair De na an doras - God's help is closer than the door." It reflects the Celtic spirituality that God is with us in the every day and mundane."

Fr. Rooney lived his life that way. His homilies and Parish bulletin columns, called Rooney's Tunes shared his love of God and devotion to the Blessed Mother. He has left a void in many lives and will be greatly missed. Hopefully we can find some comfort in knowing that the Lord greeted him with open arms saying well done good and faithful servant.

The issues faced by those living in the North of Ireland are evolving faster than we can imagine. Brexit is the main issue of the week as the British Government is pushing legislation which will greatly benefit their new post-Brexit economy yet have a devastating impact on the island of Ireland. Although admitting to violating international law and reneging on the Withdrawal agreement they are pursuing this effort. The Withdrawal agreement which came into effect in January, stipulated that the UK would adhere to some EU rules (food safety, regulations) after Brexit happens, preventing a hard border between the Republic of Ireland and the north of Ireland. This latest bill would be in opposition to that Withdrawal

agreement by allowing UK ministers to not apply the EU rules if no trade deal is made with the EU. With the EU regulations not being enforced, the threat of a hard border to protect the interests of the EU is now back in the forefront. Members of the US Congress have publicly opposed this new plan and have said that they will oppose any trade deal with the UK unless they adhere to the Withdrawal agreement.

Our FFAI Committee met in September and discussed how we can improve and increase participation in the FFAI program. We agreed that knowledge and communication is key, and we encourage all of you to ensure that your division, county and state have an FFAI appointee. This appointee can work to provide the membership at each meeting with the knowledge of the issues and progress being made in helping those in the north of Ireland gain the justice, peace, equality and independence they are looking to achieve. I am working with our National Webmaster – Beth Zuczek on updating the FFAI Page https://ladiesaoh.com/ freedom-for-all-ireland/ with updated Christmas Appeal information as well as FFAI news. I will be scheduling the Quarterly meeting with all FFAI State Chairs and any other interested members very soon to hear from all of you and share information. Mary Ellen O'Malley's County Mayo Stew

(Mary Ellen O'Malley was my Great Grandmother. She was from County Mayo, but this is not really her recipe. I got the basic from Epicurious.com and made some substitutions)

5 pounds lamb cut in cubes

3 tablespoons olive oil

3 carrots quartered

3 celery ribs

2 medium onions

1head garlic halved crosswise

3 tablespoons tomato paste

1/3 cup balsamic vinegar

2cups Jameson

2cups Guinness extra stout

2 bay leaves

2thyme sprigs

3cups beef broth

3cups water

2 1/2 pounds peel on russet potatoes cubed

1 1/2 pounds carrots

Fresh green peas to garnish Sprigs of mint to garnish

-Preheat oven to 350 with rack in the middle -pat lamb dry and season with 2 1/2 teaspoons of salt and 1 teaspoon pepper

-heat oil in pot over medium high heat and brown lamb in batches. Remove to a platter

-reduce heat to medium and add carrots, celery, onions, and garlic. Stir until well browned (about

onions, and garlic. Stir until well browned (about 12minutes)

-push vegetables to the side and add tomatoes paste stirring 2 minutes then stir into vegetables

-add vinegar and cook stirring for 2 minutes

-add broth, water, lamb, and any juice from lamb.

Bring to a simmer, cover and braise in oven for about 2 1/2 hours

Set a large colander in a large bowl, pour stew in colander, return pieces of meat to the colander, discard remaining solids, let cooking liquid stand 10 minutes -while beef braises cut carrots into slices and potatoes into wedges or cubes

-add potatoes and carrots until they are tender (about 40 minutes)

Father Timothy Hirten Past LAOH National Chaplain 2004-2006

Father Timothy Hirten, a Brooklyn priest serving as a United States Air Force chaplain, died Aug. 15, 2020 in Texas. At the time of his death, he was assigned to Sheppard Air Force base in Texas and held the rank of Major. He was 66. Father Hirten was preceded in death by his parents, Robert F. and Gladys (Kelly) Hirten. is survived by his brothers Michael, Robert, and Terrence, and his sisters, Maureen Agostinacchio, and Nancy McAtasney, his siblings' spouses; 15 nieces and nephews, and 20 great-nieces and greatnephews. Born in Mercy Hospital, Rockville Centre, Father Hirten attended Holy Spirit School, New Hyde Park; Holy Name of Mary School, Valley Stream; St. Barnabas School, Bellmore; St. John the Baptist H.S., West Islip; Franciscan University, Steubenville, Pa.; North American College, and the Pontifical University of St. Thomas, both in Rome, Italy. He was ordained Oct. 9, 1993 by Bishop Thomas V. Daily at St. James Cathedral-Basilica, Downtown Brooklyn. Prior to entering the seminary, he was a professional basketball player, travelling the world with the Washington Generals, the opponents of the Harlem Globetrotters.

Father Hirten also served as National Chaplain for the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians (2004-2006), for LAOH Division 15, and for the Knights of Columbus. He was the founder of the Catholic Sports Camp, a member of the Jones Beach Lifeguard Corps, and a lead dancer in the Hirten Family Irish Step Dancers Troupe. Fr. Tim was appointed LAOH National Chaplain in November 2004 upon the death of LAOH Natl Chaplain Msgr. Kieran J. Martin by then National President Mary Leathem; Mary said she was sorry to hear of his death, he was a wonderful Priest, great to talk to, he always made time to talk to any member that needed to talk. He served as an assistant at St. Joan of Arc, Jackson Heights, 1993-97, and Sacred Heart, Bayside, before entering the Air Force. He served in Europe and was activated following the Sept. 11 attacks on America. In 2006, he was assigned to McGuire Air Force Base in New Jersey. He did several tours in the Mideast while assigned to bases in Oklahoma and Delaware. He also held a degree in social work from Fordham University, specializing in alcohol abuse prevention. "It is hard for me to imagine that this usually exuberant, gregarious man and former professional basketball player is no longer with us. Father Hirten will be sorely missed by me and by many," said Father Steven A. Schaick, Maj. Gen., Chief of Chaplains. Father Patrick Longalong, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes parish, Queens Village, who was born in the Philippines, recalls, "Father Hirten was a professional player for the Philippine Basketball Association. "He was one of the imports in the first Tanduay Basketball Team (1976). When I was in the seminary, he organized basketball games and created a team called the 'Running Revs.' ""He will always be remembered as a good priest and a good athlete," A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated Wednesday, Aug. 26, at St. Barnabas Church, Bellmore. Auxiliary Bishop Raymond Chappetto was the principal celebrant. Msgr. James Pareda preached the homily. Burial was in Long Island National Cemetery.


