Amanda is a member of Golden Rose, Queen of Ireland Division 1 in Austin Texas. They started their division in 2015 and are currently the only division in Texas with about 20 members. Each member is given a handcrafted golden rose when she is initiated. (see photo) Amanda and her mom joined the LAOH in 2017. After going on a family trip to Ireland in 2013, they became more interested in their Irish heritage and wanted to join a group where they could embrace it. They saw an advertisement in the parish newsletter and called for more information.

Amanda became the Mission and Charities officer her second year as a member in her division. In 2020 she became president of her division. Not fully realizing at first that this also meant she was now a State President, she has embraced the position and is working hard to learn as much as she can.

If a positive can come out of 2020, it is that the National Board went virtual. This has allowed Amanda and other state officers the ability to attend quarterly meetings and watch presentations. She has

met so many people and is getting a lot of support, just what every new president needs. Amanda takes it all in and brings it back to her division, keeping them informed of what is going on around the country. She has already been tapped to join the national membership committee to work on ways to increase our membership.

Working in the healthcare field, Amanda knows it is important to keep her members safe, so they have not been meeting in person. She has been able to keep her division engaged and active through zoom. She hosts trivia nights, holds Rosary zooms and keeps up their Facebook page.

Locally there are Irish dance groups, a Cultural Center and the Irish Consulate General, Claire McCarthy. The division participates in the Celtic Festival sponsored by the Cultural Center, by having a table and selling water. They had a fundraising tea to raise money for the St Louis House, helping women and children. Their division is proud that they were able to raise enough resources to purchase sashes to wear when attending events. When they were able to meet in person, they would attend mass at their members different parishes and then gather for a meal together

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afterwards. Amanda is working on a virtual advent calendar so she can stay in touch with her members during the holy season of advent.



Hello ladies. It is that time of year for your Division to think about making their end of year donations to the Columban Sisters, Columban Fathers and our Appeals for Aid fund. In this article I will focus on the Appeals for Aid fund.

The National LAOH Appeals for Aid fund is intended to provide limited aid to charities that vou, the members, submit for consideration at the National Convention. Per our constitution Article XV, section 8. G.: "All appeals for aid requests must be from a 501(c)(3) charity and submitted to the Missions & Charities Officer 45 days prior to the Convention". At the Virtual National Convention that occurred in July 2020, the fund was able to award grants of approximately \$1600 to ten very worthy causes. These are charities that your sisters from around the country are involved with and support locally. The thank you notes from these agencies were not only heartwarming but showed the direct impact our Order can have in your community.

Whether you run a 50/50 at your Division meetings, hold a bake sale, or conduct a basket raffle, every little bit collected for Appeals for Aid will go toward the charities that are supported by LAOH members. Times are very difficult now with COVID 19 on the rise throughout the country and raising funds can be more challenging than ever before. However, our next National Convention is scheduled for July 2022 in Pittsburgh, PA, and there will be plenty of time to be creative in raising money for this fund. There is also plenty of time to consider a local agency for submission to receive funds. Start planning now and be ready to submit requests early in 2022 so you do not miss the deadline. I will be reporting on the balance in this fund periodically until our National Convention in 2022. Currently there is a little over \$3500 in the Appeals for Aid fund.

I hope you all had a safe and Happy Thanksgiving and by the time you read this we will be inching toward the Christmas season.

delivered to the donors. Thank you to all who donated in 2019-2020.

Brexit News: Time is running out for Britain and the EU to work out a post-Brexit trade agreement and the next few weeks are critical to getting a deal in place by December 31. If that deadline is missed, the risk is a significant trade disruption which would cause catastrophic economic losses. In addition to a trade deal, there are also other agreements required to be settled such as fishing rights, dispute resolution and treaty pacts. The showstopper is the UK plan to pass legislation for trade between the north of Ireland and the rest of the United Kingdom in the event of a nodeal Brexit. That bill would violate international law by over-riding the withdrawal agreement previously agreed to with the EU in January by allowing UK ministers to not apply the EU rules if no trade deal is made with the EU. With the EU regulations not being enforced, the threat of a EU required hard border to protect the Republic from unregulated products is high. In the US, American Irish groups are putting pressure on elected officials to not approve any trade deal with the UK if the bill goes through. Members of the US Congress and other elected officials have said that they will oppose any trade deal with the UK unless they adhere to the Withdrawal agreement and ensure that there will be no hard border on the island and no dismantling of the Good Friday Agreement.

FFAI Events: On October 24, 2020 Hibernians were honored to be invited to the Plastic Justice event sponsored by Relatives for Justice. We joined RFJ at this virtual launch of the Plastic Justice Report and heard heart-wrenching stories from families who had loved ones killed in the conflict with plastic bullets fired by security forces. RFJ discussed their research based on years of analysis and spotlighted many of the cases and the lack of anyone being held accountable for these killings. On December 5, we will again be hosting an event with our AOH brothers and those in the north of Ireland regarding the Hunger Strikers. As the 40th anniversary of the Hunger Strike nears, we are looking forward to hearing from some of those who went on Hunger Strike. Please stay tuned for the details, which

will be available on our LAOH Freedom For All Ireland Facebook Page, national website page and will be mailed to all on the FFAI mailing list. I recently held the quarterly meeting with FFAI State Chairs, as well as all other interested members and we discussed several topics, including what we can do to increase participation and awareness of FFAI in the LAOH. We all agreed that communication and knowledge is key and that our goal is to make sure that all Divisions have an FFAI appointee. This appointee is critical for each Division in relaying the latest information on the news, issues and programs affecting those living in the north of Ireland. Division Presidents, please appoint a FFAI Chairperson and provide them with the FFAI information available on our national website page and Facebook Page. I am also happy to assist if you need any help.



As we rang in the New Year and looked forward to upcoming plans and events for 2020, the possibility of a Global Pandemic could not have been foreseen nor the impact it would have on every level of our lives.

To support a local charity The Children's Beach House in Lewes (help for children with special needs to reach their highest potential), a group of sisters assisting non-profit Lunch with a Purpose contributed gifts, sold tickets and enthusiastically participated in both silent and live auctions. Much needed funds were raised and everyone had a great time and it brightened a blustery winter day.

Also in January, arrangements were made for our annual celebration of St. Brigid's feast day on February 1st. Many members with their families attended Mass at St. Edmond's and afterwards enjoyed sharing breakfast together.

Another accomplishment in February was providing overflowing backpacks for Sussex County Foster Parents Association for foster children in crisis. For our sisters and their families undergoing difficulties, we established the "Sunshine Sisters Fund" - a resource to provide financial assistance during an emergency.

Our Governor, John Carney as in the past designated March IRISH-AMERICAN month. LAOH members Mary Lydon Cappelli (President), MaryJo Venerus (Vice President) and Barbara Kelly (Mission and Charities) accompanied by AOH President Kevin Cunnion bore witness to the signing of the Proclamation in the Governor's office in Legislative Hall in our State capital, Dover on March 5th.

A fortunate date change to March 8th made it possible for LAOH sisters and AOH lads to march in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Milton prior to the Covid lockdown. The Pandemic crisis brought activities

including Mass to an abrupt halt in mid-March. Most annual events including High Tea at Victoria's in April, the pot-luck dinner in June, participation in the International student dinners and a much anticipated Retreat in October with Brother Mickey O'Neill McGrath OSFS had to be cancelled.



The Massachusetts State Board, and the members of Division 10, Lynn are excited to share with you that Kathleen Savage is this year's recipient of the David R. Burke Golden Bridges Award. This award was established in 2009 by Martin O'Maheur of the Irish Echo to honor the memory of David Burke (well known throughout the Irish Republic and Northern Ireland) who passed away on May 27, 2009. The purpose of this award is to honor someone from America who has built a bridge through actions and works between America (Boston and New England) and Ireland. Kathleen has been a member of Division 10 for 38 years, and has also held many elective positions at the division and county levels. Kathleen, the Freedom for All Ireland LAOH Chair, has held that position at the division, county, state and national levels. Kathleen was a recipient of the late John Murphy award given by Division 5 AOH in Albany NY for her effort on behalf of FFAI and was the first woman from outside of the state of New York to receive the award. For more than 30 years, Kathleen has worked tirelessly with the LAOH and AOH Freedom for All Ireland Christmas Appeal, and has written Christmas and birthday cards to prisoners in Northern Ireland while encouraging LAOH sisters to join her. Kathleen has made more than 20 trips to Northern Ireland where she witnessed the discrimination of Irish families by the British Government. She has visited prisoners in Long Kesh, Crumlin and Maghaberry prisons where she became a

Kathleen is a member of Sacred Heart Parish in Lynn, MA where she serves as a Eucharistic (Extraordinary) Minister, is a member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, and worked for many years at the food pantry. Kathleen also belongs the Secular Franciscan Order Church Fraternity.

Maryland

Patricia Slaughter from the LAOH, Annapolis Division #1 and has spent the past two decades in a position of giving herself to those in their time of need. Through her selfless dedication to the betterment of others, she has established herself as a progressive thinker with a drive for success. Patricia has been passionate in her determination for assisting others, which was very apparent early on as she spent over a decade with Christian Child Care spearheading efforts on a global scale. Spending almost 15 years in the field, side by side with many Catholic societies, working in offices located in Africa, Germany, Bangladesh & Honduras she met with various religious and foreign dignitaries to bring light to the cause. The CCC organization benefited greatly from her creative approach to basic principles and the idea that everyone deserves a chance at a better life. This mantra has followed Patricia throughout her charitable career and is evident in the daily work she immerses herself in.

Her spark and vision to provide support to others was the very foundation of what has become The Bernie House, which is a unique transitional home for victims of domestic violence.

While volunteering for the abused persons program as a court companion, she witnessed and assisted a victim having a panic attack, while waiting for the abuser's arraignment. It was then and there Patricia heard God's call and answered.

Having no formal degree in social work or a similar field, Patricia took the vision she had and made The Bernie House a reality through a passionate pursuit and a clear understanding of what it is she wanted to accomplish. Most who look to accomplish this type of idea do so in about 10 years, Patricia got it done in

4 years, which is a shining example of how her drive and focus have been able to help her achieve the seemingly impossible.

To date The Bernie House program has facilities in Montgomery County, MD and Anne Arundel County, MD. 9 families have benefited from the program including 19 children. When graduating from TBH program they are prepared for a life of independence with a strong foundation for sustainability. While in TBH the very vulnerable children watch their mother hurdle real financial, emotional, and physical abuse caused by domestic violence, they see that anything is possible which makes a lifelong impression on them. They learn that violence is not an effective way to resolve conflicts or problems and is not the norm in relationships. Above all they feel safe, and often for the first time in their lives. They can be a child. Patricia has a history of success because of her skilled ability to pool different agencies and resources so they work together seamlessly which ensures a more successful transition and assistance program. This approach has given The Bernie House an 80% success rate due to focusing on one family at a time. Her tireless efforts have developed a support system for those in need and she continues to hone and polish the process with the future always in mind.

They married in 1962 and were married for 64 years until Pat's passing in 2016. They had 4 children and three grandchildren.

Eileen led a life of service here in Rochester. She was very involved at her church, was on the Irish Festival Committee for years and was on the Parade Committee for an impressive 41 years! In 1999 she was Co-Grand Marshall of the Rochester Saint Patrick's Day Parade. Her involvement with the LAOH was extensive. She joined in 1980. Locally she held the offices of secretary, treasurer, vice-president and president. She served as Chair of the County Board for 8 years and served on the New York State Board in Immigration, Catholic Action and as Historian.

Since her beloved Pat's passing she has lived alone. Of living alone she said, "I've never lived alone and hate, hate, hate it!"
