The History of the LAOH

It is always a good time to share the history of the LAOH and how we became the largest women's Irish Catholic organization in the United States, but now is a great time. This comes from National Vice President Marilyn Madigan as shared with the membership at our 125th anniversary celebration. Please feel free to share our history as needed.

"Congratulations Sisters on our 125th Anniversary. This is a wonderful time to be a member of the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians as we celebrate 125 years of dedication and service to our Catholic Faith, our Irish Heritage and our American homeland.

Let us go back in time and reflect on our beginnings and our accomplishments over the past century and quarter. First, we need to thank our Brother Hibernians who established the Auxiliary at the Omaha Convention in 1894. Our first elected President Anna Malia in an article in the National Hibernian describes the beginning of our Order. "In May 1894 at the National Convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians held in the city of Omaha, Nebraska, some ladies had the temerity to ask permission to organize an Auxiliary to the

Ancient Order of Hibernians, whose principal object would be to help promote the three great principles of the parent body and to be an auxiliary in the true sense of the word. The AOH delegates (like all good, tender-hearted Irishmen) I presume could not refuse the ladies and the privilege was granted, with the thought, no doubt, Oh we will never hear from them again. It is but a whim of the moment. (But they did hear from us again and continue to hear from us.) At the following Convention held in Detroit Michigan "the Auxiliary left no doubt of its earnestness and by the perseverance of its representatives succeeded in having a National Organization effected." As we meet here in Detroit celebrating this milestone, I think we can all say that the LAOH and AOH is a blessing to the Irish American Community.

One of our first accomplishments was the establishment of the Trinity College Scholarship. Trinity College was the first Catholic Woman's College. The idea of establishing the Trinity Scholarship was Mary E. Halloran a Past State President from Detroit Michigan and the 1902 delegation approved this endeavor. The Ladies collected \$10,000 for this scholarship even before

they had a National Treasury. Upon the presentation of \$10,000 to the College, Archbishop Farley stated "we have here today in the presence of so many Irish American mothers, sisters and daughters, filled with the same old love of learning which has never forsaken the Irish heart. May this day, to you ladies of the Auxiliary, be a memorable one in your lives, may the thought of it and the part you played long remain in the hearts of your children and your children's children, and may they point in future days with pride that you were the first to recognize the magnificent work which is being done by the Sisters in charge of Trinity College." Just image all the woman who received a College education because of the efforts of our early members and the contributions they have made to our Country.

In the August 15, 1906 issue of the National Hibernian, it was stated that "The convention of the Ladies Auxiliary was just as much a success, taking material things into consideration as that of the men's Order itself. It may not have been attended with all the parliamentary knowledge of the latter, nor with the flow of oratory or fervid appeals, which generally distinguish the men's gathering (times have changed) but its business was in a manner that reflects the highest credit on our women and proves them to be possessed of that genius and ability necessary for the management of their own affairs. This year marks a new era in the history of the Ladies Auxiliary, and henceforth they will be empowered to elect their own board of officers, levy their own assessments and manage their own funds and they will be only subject to the men's Order in matters which imply loyalty to the fundamental principles of the organization. In all else they will possess home rule." Today as we celebrate our Anniversary, we are no longer an Auxiliary but a organization in our right. I am sure that the early leaders are proud of our achievements.

The 1906 Convention was presided over by the President of the Advisory Board Mary Quinn from Illinois. At the Convention there were over 300 delegates representing nearly every State and Territory in the Union. In the National Hibernian the delegates were described as "the cream of the Catholic womanhood of America and embraced within their ranks many of the brightest and most gifted minds." National AOH President Dolan in the National Hibernian "bears testimony to the excellence of the Ladies Auxiliary and gives them full credit to for the noble work they have performed." "We believe the Irish American woman of this country are realizing the great advantages of membership in an organization of this character and that the Ladies Auxiliary is destined to become the greatest fraternal society of Catholic woman on this continent. "Sisters, we are this legacy.

The Decade from 1910-1920 was a very troubling time for the world. The Easter Rising, World War I and the movement to obtain the votes for women. Our Order was blessed with wonderful leadership during this period. I call them our Trifecta: Ellen Ryan Jolly, Mary McWhorter and Adele Christy. All of these women were aware of our proud Irish and Irish American History. It was Ellen Ryan Jolly who was the brainchild behind the Nuns of the Battlefield Monument to remember the Sisters from 12 different order who nursed the wounded and dying during the American Civil War. The membership was behind this monument and worked hard in collecting donations and working with Congress to find a suitable place for the Monument. This Monument is across the street from St. Matthew's Cathedral in Washington DC. When visiting the Monument, you have to go to the back to see that the Ladies Auxiliary of the Ancient Order of Hibernians was responsible for this Monument that tells the story of an important period in our History. No one should have to go to the back of any monument to see the accomplishments of our Order and we are working with the National Park Service with plans to change this situation. Jolly, McWhorter and Christy were very committed to the establishment of an Irish Republic. Only 5 women of those 5, 3 were leaders in the LAAOH were invited to address a Congressional Committee on the Irish Question in 1918. Women did not even have the right to vote yet

but members of our Order were addressing a Congressional Committee. We as members of the LAOH need to remember the voices of these early leaders and add our voices to the causes that are important to our Catholic Faith, Irish Heritage, and our homelands both Ireland and America.

Our Order has been very generous to our Church with donations to the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception with gifts of the St. Brigid Altar, Chalice and paten, replica of the Cross of Cong, Missal stand and an illuminated Missal. During World War I donations were collected to supply the Chaplains with Mass Kits. Bishop Galvin approached our Order for assistance with the Columban Missions in 1935. Our primary Charity is the Columban Fathers and Sisters. Just think of all the Missionaries we have helped with spreading the word of Christ. Our Religious have always held a special place in the Irish heart. Our Order has contributed to All Hallows Seminary in Ireland but one of the greatest achievements is the establishment of Project St. Patrick with the AOH under the leadership of Ed Wallace and Kathie Linton. This project was established to continue the vision of St. Patrick "to bring the Gospel and the Eucharist to all people." We truly live our motto of Christian Charity.

In 1978, the AOH and LAOH joined together to establish the Hibernian Chair at the University of Notre Dame. Funds collected by the Hibernians have been donated to the Hibernian Scholarship, Cushwa Center for the Study of American Catholicism, and the Keough Naughton Center for Irish Studies. These funds have assisted many of our sons and daughters attend the University with scholarships. The centerpiece is the Annual Hibernian Lecture and Hibernian Research Grants. Anyone who has attended the Lectures can attest that we are meeting the goal of our early leaders to promote Irish and Irish American History. Many of our Members have had the privilege to attend these lectures and I encourage more to attend.

As an individual that loves history, I could go on and on about our proud history but it is time to celebrate.

In 1907 AOH President stated, "that the Ladies Auxiliary is destined to become the greatest fraternal society of Catholic woman on this continent." In 2019, we can say that the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians is the greatest Irish American Woman's Organization thanks to each and every member who has dedicated themselves to our motto of Friendship, Unity and Christian Charity today and during the past 125 years. Sisters we have a proud legacy. What will be the legacy of today's members? I am confident because of my Sisters here today as well as those across our Country that it will be a great legacy. Thank you for your dedication and commitment to our Order. Since our Anniversary, we have made great strides with promoting our Organization with the Embracing Our Heritage Program with a Grant from the Irish Emigrant Support Program, our own Hibernian Herald, speaking up on Women Veterans' issues, Political Education Committee, hosting webinars on Immigration, Catholic Social Justice and issues in the North of Ireland. Our members have been very generous to FFAI, Project St. Patrick, SOAR, Columban Fathers, Columban Sisters and the Ukraine Appeal.

The LAOH is proud of our longstanding history of working with our AOH Brothers. We want to continue to live our Motto in Friendship with the AOH, united in our common goals and an example of Christian Charity."

Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians held a special place in Sis's heart. She first became a member in 1974, after she and her husband. Don, came home to Anaconda after living throughout the United States following construction jobs. However, this stay was short lived. One night at dinner, they asked their five kids if they would like to live in Persia and the adventure began, living in Iran and Thiland. Sis then followed Don to Mexico before returning to Anaconda for good. That is when she was reinstated as a member of the LAOH in 1991.

Sis held many LAOH offices at the Division and State levels: Division President, Historian, Catholic Action and publicity chair: State President, Vice President, Historian, Catholic Action and publicity chair. Besides being an officer, Sis spearheaded the

drive to order vests and sashes for each member, was a charter member of the Irish Washer Women Brigade and the Aishlings Irish Dancers. Every year she donated a square for the Anaconda Division 1 Irish quilt raffle, proceeds going to a local charitable organization.
