I am incredibly thankful to be a recipient of the National 2022 Appeals for Aid Award. The \$4,838.62 will be used to purchase exterior cameras, including the installation of cameras, the annual security service fee, and the annual wireless fee (required for camera use) for both properties. The support from the National LAOH makes a huge difference so that our residents will not live in fear and can feel safe. One of the many goals of The Bernie House program is to provide a safe genuine family environment for up to two years which allows the families the necessary time to heal and build confidence as they start their transition to independence. Another is to provide ongoing services for survivors and prepare them for the next step - stability and success in permanent housing. It is a key steppingstone for our residents to secure a job, go to school, become economically stable and achieve a safe and healthy return to their community. Your generosity helps us to provide all of this and will unlock the door to unlimited possibilities for our families for generations to come. Victims come into our program survivors, while in our program they become thrivers, and when they leave, they are conquerors equipped with the education and skills to be economically stable. Families are living a safe and healthy life filled with hope because of you and the National LAOH.

One of my favorite songs is, a quote; "And they'll know we are Christians by our Love." We will work with each other, we will work side by side. We will guard each man's dignity and save each man's pride. And they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love.
