As this Edition is dedicated to St. Brigid let's recap some more stories about her



As many of you know, Saint Brigid is known as 'Mary of the Gael' and was born to a Christian slave mother and a pagan chief father.

- St. Brigid lived her whole life with deep Christian characteristics, mainly for the care and encouragement of the poor. She often gave away items that belonged to her father, enraging him. Legend states her response to him when he spoke with her was merely, "Christ dwells in every creature."
- At one point, Brigid's father was so angry with her for giving his items away, including a sword to a leper, that he attempted to give her to the King. The Christian King understood her actions and responded to her father, "Her merit before God is greater than ours." The words of the King forced Brigid's father to realize her faith and generosity were of a different sphere than others, and he granted her freedom to live her life as she pleased.
- There are several spellings of Brigid and many names to know of her: Brig, Brighid, Brigit, Bride, Bride of the Isles, Bridget of Ireland, Brigid of Kildare. Mary of the Gaels.
- St Brigid's name was essentially only familiar to those who spoke Irish, the English-speaking world knew virtually nothing of her. When her

name was said, amongst the non-Irish, it was common to confuse her with the Swedish woman.

- Once granted her freedom by her father, Brigid became a nun and a formal disciple of St. Patrick.
- She established several monasteries, including a significant center of religion and learning in Kildare.
- Initially, the convent was located at the foot of Croghan Hill. Then, at some time, Brigid decided to move the convent to Druin Criadh, where she erected her famous Convent of Cill Dara under a large oak tree, translated as "the church of the oak." Today, one can find Kildare Cathedral standing there. Throughout her adult life, she helped in founding other communities of nuns.
- Her community became a double abbey for monks and nuns, with the abbess ranking above the abbot. Additionally, she built a school of art that focused on metalwork and illumination.
- Before her death, Brigid was the Mother Abbess of thirteen thousand nuns.
- Brigid was buried in Kildare Cathedral. Around the year 878, Scandinavian raids forced the Church to move the relics of St. Brigid to Downpatrick, where they were interred in the tombs of St. Patrick and St. Columba.
- Her shrine in Faughart is still hugely popular with pilgrims who leave votive offerings by the well and on sacred rocks.
- Her shrine in Faughart (once the site of a significant monastery) is popular with pilgrims who leave votive
 offerings by the well and on sacred rocks, initially used for pagan worship.
- Her name translates as 'Fiery Arrow.'
- Reputedly the only female bishop there has ever been!


- One of Brigid's most genuinely profound legends is the story of Dara, the blind nun. The nun requested Brigid, for the prayers of vision restoration. After the miracle happened, Dara realized that the clarity of sight blurred God in the eye of the soul, after which she asked Brigid to return her to the beauty of darkness.
- The St. Brigid is the patron saint of babies, blacksmiths, boatmen, cattle farmers, children whose parents are not married, children whose mothers are mistreated by the children's fathers, Clan Douglas, dairymaids, dairy workers, fugitives, Ireland, Leinster, mariners, midwives, milkmaids, nuns, poets, the poor, poultry farmers, poultry raisers, printing presses, sailors, scholars, travelers, and watermen.
- St. Brigid was a master ale brewer, she turned bathwater into beer and several of her miracles are associated with beer and red ale. Believe it or not, beer was considered most sanitary during St. Brigid's time and even more nutritious than water. In one story, a group of lepers asked St. Brigid to help them. She saw a barrel of bathwater, blessed it, and low and behold, it turned into ale! She did this once for a group of visiting priests, too. It is reported that during Easter, she took one barrel of beer from her convent to supply beer to eighteen local churches. Another report is that St Brigid wrote a poem stating she would "like to give a lake of beer to God" and "love the heavenly host to be tippling there for all eternity."
- Due to her generous spirit, Brigid often assisted the hungry and poor with miracles related to feeding the hungry. Most of her food miracles included dairy products such as butter and milk.
- <u>The Bethu Brigte</u> talks of St. Brigid's 46 miracles, which include healings as well as making food or domestic animals appear that she would then give to those in need.
- In artwork, St. Brigid is often pictured holding a cross, a burning flame, and a book or manuscript. The manuscript represents her great learning and wisdom. The flame refers to the name Brigid, which means "fiery arrow."
- The cross that she holds is commonly called St. Brigid's Cross and was first made, according to tradition, by the saint herself. It is said that as a pagan chieftain lay dying, he requested that St. Brigid visit him. By the time St. Brigid had arrived, the chieftain was almost in despair. Quietly, St. Brigid gathered some rushes and skillfully wove them together as a cross. When asked to explain what she was doing, St. Brigid replied, "This is a cross, which I make in honor of the Virgin's son, who died for us upon a cross of wood." She then spoke so convincingly about Christ and His saving death on the cross that the dying man immediately asked to be baptized and died a Christian.
- Some legends assert that Brigid invented keening. This belief came from the legends around fairies, whose cries
 echo through the night during times of grief. Thus, a mourning period would be observed, followed by a
 sumptuous feast of joy.
- Ireland now has a new public holiday for St Brigid's Day, which officially started on February 1, 2023.



further.




We were invited to tour the library of Commodore Barry, which amazed all who visited. The books and artifacts brought tears to our eyes and wowed us at the same time. The variety of books and magazines covered many topics, as well

as an LAOH charter and historical artifacts, including a newspaper that told the story of Grace Plunket rushing into a jewelry store just before close to purchase her wedding ring.

The Famine Pot was among the most stirring objects for many of us to see and touch. "The humble famine pots' sole purpose was to feed the starving population in the packed workhouses and in temporary soup kitchens that had been set up around the country." as the

famine progressed, other people, ". . . both Catholic and Protestant" got involved in the provision of relief, however, not all for positive purposes





donated pots. The Philadelphia Irish Famine Relief Committee and the Philadelphia Society of Friends (Quakers), led by Thomas Cope, funneled relief supplies from all over the United States to Ireland. "After the famine, little value was attached to these pots, many of them were used by farmers to feed animals, hold grain, or for other farming needs. They have been used as garden planters and ornamental pieces. However, in recent years there has been a resurgence of interest in these once vital objects and many have been restored and given the due respect and honor they rightfully deserve."



Of the many stories and legends of our patron Saint Brigid, which is your favorite and why!

Sister Kathleen Mary Smith, RSM ~ Chaplain ~ The story/legend that comes first to mind is my first visit to Ireland. My Dad's family is from Kildare. Dad's first cousin has a farm an Irish half-mile from the Parish Church and New current Shrine area. I walked that path along the road with him many times from the McLoughlin Farm to the Parish Church and Mick shared stories of all the miracles people have experienced. Mick hand-built a very Modest white washed stone St. Brigid's Shrine right next to the road on his own property and many little flower bouquets are placed there by locals and visitors in thanksgiving for Brigid's goodness.

Kathleen Diulus ~ President ~ *I don't have a favorite story of St. Brigid---what inspires me is that variety of patronesses that are attributed to her: poetry, blacksmiths, healing, fertility, cattle and fire. St Brigid inspires and guides so many who are looking for inspiration. She obviously was ahead of her time, as the world celebrates Brigid 1500 in 2024; it is her strength that resonates with me regardless of the situation she faced. I am excited to visit Kildare in April, the site of the abbey which St Brigid founded. I will be sure to share photos with you via this newsletter when I return.*

Carolyn Killion ~ Vice President ~ My favorite St. Brigid tradition is hanging a St. Brigid Cross over a doorway so that St. Brigid will bless my home and family throughout the year. And yes, I do have crosses in both my houses!

Patti Flaus ~ Secretary ~ We've all seen the St. Brigid's cross, but I've never hears this story about it before.

St. Brigid's Cross: Making a St. Brigid's cross is one of the traditional rituals in Ireland to celebrate the beginning of early spring, 1st February. The crosses are made of rushes that are pulled rather than cut. They are hung by the door and in the rafters to protect the house from fire and evil. According to tradition a new cross is made each St Brigid's Day, and the old one is burned to keep fire from the house. Many homes have several crosses preserved in the ceiling, the oldest blackened by many years of hearth fires. Some believe that keeping a cross in the ceiling or roof is a good way to preserve the home from fire which was always a major threat in houses with thatch and wood roofs. St. Brigid and her cross are linked together by the story that she wove this form of cross at the death bed of either her father or a pagan lord, who upon hearing what the cross meant, asked to be baptized.

One version goes as follows: "A pagan chieftain from the neighborhood of Kildare was dying. Christians in his household sent for Brigid to talk to him about Christ. When she arrived, the chieftain was raving. As it was impossible to instruct this delirious man, hopes for his conversion seemed doubtful. Brigid sat down at his bedside and began consoling him. As was customary, the dirt floor was strewn with rushes both for warmth and cleanliness. Brigid stooped down and started to weave them into a cross, fastening the points together. The sick man asked what she was doing. She began to explain the cross, and as she talked his delirium quieted and he questioned her with growing interest. Through her weaving, he converted and was baptized at the point of death. Since then, the cross of rushes has been venerated in Ireland."

Carole Cooney-Syzdek ~ Treasurer ~ The question of her Sainthood intrigues and upsets me. I pray that with continued research, it will someday be proven that St. Brigid is a true Saint, not a con artist responsible of medieval identity theft. Until proven otherwise, she will remain St. Brigid to me and I hope this never becomes tainted.

Brianna M. Curran ~ Historian: I really love how St. Brigid is the patron saint of the people -midwives, newborns, Irish nuns, fugitives, blacksmiths, dairymaids, boatmen, chicken farmers, cattle, scholars, sailors, and of course beer! There are countless stories of miracles about her charity that have been handed down. It is said that when she churned butter, she would give a large portion to the poor, but then the butter would miraculously be replenished. When asked why she helped the poor, St. Brigid is recorded as having answered, "Christ is in the person of every poor person who believes." She then continued, "I find it hard to deny Christ His own food." She truly cared about the people, and I could not think of a better saint to be the patronage of our Order.

Kathleen Varady ~ Freedom for All Ireland, Immigration & Education ~ Of course for me it's the legend of Brigid and the King of Leinster. She told him that she had a place in Kildare where she wanted to build her convent, beside a forest where they could gather firewood and near a lake that would provide water. The land was also very fertile. The King denied her request but she was persistent and asked if he would grant her as much land as her cloak would cover. She sent her four workers to go in all directions north south east and west and as they walked the cloak grew and spread across many acres. The King then realized that Brigid truly was blessed by God and she was able to build her monastery.


