

It has been a busy 2025 for my office. After completing the States Juniors and Degree teams reports, it was time to go to work with meetings.

I am very excited about our **Juniors**. The Coordinators and State Officers and I have had several zoom meetings. We have corrected and updated the brochure, and all the forms related to the Juniors, to be in line with the 2024 National Constitution. Additionally, we have created an *Application to Form a Junior Division* and a *National Primer on Organizing a Junior Division of the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians, Inc.* All of these have been placed on the Juniors section of the Vice President's webpage on the LAOH website.

As I met with our **State Vice Presidents**, I verified that they received a copy of the letter and the nomination form for the **Countess Markievicz Award** and requested them to share this information with their divisions. The nominations are due to me by June 30, 2025, and the award will be presented at the LAOH National Interim Board meeting on September 13, 2025. I personally encourage all divisions to look at their membership for nominations. I also encouraged the Vice Presidents to look at the information on Junior divisions and which State divisions might be able to look at starting a Junior Division. These young ladies will be our future, and it is another way to increase their membership.

I met with our **Degree Teams**. I have asked them to notify me of any upcoming degree ceremonies in order for them to be placed on the Degree section of the Vice President's page on our national website. Eligible candidates are welcome to register at any ceremony to make their degree, please see the website on the Vice-President's page for Degree Registration information. Teams who might be interested in conferring degrees at the Omaha convention will let me know by July 1st. Committing this early will allow them to fundraise. If we do not have any teams interested, we will again look at the

Traveling Degree team.

I was asked, by President Lubinsky, to put together the logistics (transportation/hotels and itinerary) for the 2025 FFAI trip with the help of Rita O'Hara the Co-Chair of the FFAI committee and National Organizer Marilyn Madigan. As we are a Catholic organization we did include a few extra stops. We stopped in for Mass at the St. Patrick's Cathedral in Drogheda. This Cathedral has the head of St. Oliver Plunkett; this year is the 400th anniversary of his birth. We made a brief stop in Faughart at the National Shrine of St. Brigid. The LAOH donated to the restoration of the Shrine in 1997, to honor our Patroness, St. Brigid. We visited the AOH Hall in Newry, while presenting a check, and onto Belfast and Derry for meeting with recipients of the FFAI grants and hearing their stories. There were numerous wonderful speakers and presentations. There was a day in Inishowen where we had the opportunity to visit an amazing Republican repository full of collections. The beatification cause of Sister Clare Crockett, an inspirational young Irish religious sister who died in 2016 at the age of 33, formally opened in Madrid, Spain. Sister Clare is from Derry, and we took the opportunity to visit her grave and place flowers. Her story is a wonderful one and you can see it on YouTube, it is called "All or Nothing." We toured the National Famine Museum in Strokestown, and in celebration of the end of St. Brigid's 1500th we visited Kildare and had a mini retreat at the Solas Bhride Center and St. Brigid's well. On our last day, LAOH National Organizer Marilyn Madigan, FFAI Co-Chair Rita O'Hara and myself met with AOH President Sean Pender and Martin Galvin, as well as a few others, at the Department of Foreign Affairs for the US in Dublin. I am attaching only a few photos as not to conflict with the FFAI Chair's report.

After returning from Ireland in April, I was home for 4 days and then headed to South Bend, IN for **Notre Dame**'s **Cushwa Center**'s 50th anniversary conference and was there for an additional 4 days. While in Notre Dame, besides attending seminars

AOH/LAOH NATIONAL CONVENTION

Now that the State Conventions are winding down, it is time to look forward to the 2026 AOH/LAOH Biennial Convention. The Convention is scheduled to take place at the beautiful Hilton located in downtown Omaha, Nebraska from July 15-19, 2026. All events

and meetings will take place at the Omaha Hilton and the Convention Center that is located directly across the street from the Hilton via a sky bridge. The hotel recently underwent a \$13 million room renovation and a \$2 million renovation to the lobby. The hotel room rate is \$132.00 per night plus taxes effective July 11-19.

The Eppley airport is 3.4 miles away from the hotel. The Omaha Hilton has a complimentary shuttle service that runs to Eppley Airport every 30 minutes. This is a 24-hour service. There will be a 50% discount for overnight self-parking in the hotel's attached garage. Valet parking is also available. The hotel is in an excellent location with plenty of restaurant options, shopping, and entertainment within walking distance. There is a complimentary shuttle provided by the hotel for those that do not want to walk.

Please keep in mind that the LAOH will be holding a Constitution Convention prior to the opening of the National Convention. It is tentatively set for Wednesday, July 11, 2026. The Convention Committee is planning a visit to the Omaha Hilton soon. Further details will be forthcoming including the package price, Degrees, Constitution Convention, etc.

Omaha, Nebraska is the birthplace of The Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians. The women were recognized as the "Daughters of Erin" at the AOH National Convention held in Omaha, Nebraska in 1894. The women sought their own identity, and it was at this Convention that the AOH relented and allowed the formation of the "Daughters of Erin." In 1906, their name was changed to the Ladies Auxiliary to the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America. In 1984, the ladies voted to change their name to the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians. The Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians was incorporated in 2004. The LAOH has come a long way. More reason to attend this Convention and celebrate the LAOH at their birthplace!






